Dear Friends,

Advent is here and once again we hear certain words more than at other times of the year. The ones that come to mind for me are preparation and anticipation. Once again it is time to prepare for the birth of Jesus Christ. In our secular world we are busy preparing for Christmas by shopping, whether it's at the mall or online, for gifts for those we hold dear in our lives. We have to find a tree at the local nursery or pull out the artificial tree that was put in storage about 10.5 months ago. If we are hosting the family dinner, there are lots of cookies to be bake, gingerbread houses to be decorated and dusting off those recipes that we only pull out at this time of the year.

At church, the right banners have to pulled out of storage, the poinsettias have to be bought and properly watered until December 24th. The choirs are busy rehearsing in order to make these important days truly special.

But when do we allow ourselves time to prepare ourselves for what is the most important activity of all, reflecting on the Nativity of Our Lord and the importance that that signifies? All too often we get caught up in the busyness of the day and only realize that we have run out of time for that as we are putting our decorations away for another year. Give yourself some time to savor the anticipation that many of us have not felt since we were much younger. It's never too late to take the time to do that during this Advent season.

Here at Christ Lutheran Church, the word anticipation is a heavily-used word. We of course anticipate the coming of a new pastor at a time yet unknown to any of us. This Christmas Eve, we are fortunate to welcome back Pastor Martin Nale to lead us in worship at the 5:30PM and 8:00PM services. For those of you who really believe in planning ahead, Pastor Nale will also preside at the worship services during Holy Week in April. You see, I too believe in being prepared should we not have a pastor by then.

We are slowly trying to return to normal with what we do here at church. With the coming of the new church year, acolytes are returning as part of our worship service. We had hoped to be able to have the ushers passing the offering plate again, but out of a sense of caution, we will try to find other ways to make it easy for you to make your contributions to the church. One practice that is returning is the placement of fresh flowers on the altar. During the pandemic we were utilizing artificial flowers for the altar. Flowers, just as everything else, have become more expensive. Florists are unwilling to make deliveries for what they had been paid previously (\$40 per week) so we will be forced to find other alternatives. For now, flower memorials will stay at \$15 but that is likely to change some time in the new year. The Church Council has also determined that the annual transfer of funds from the Flower Fund to the Operating account of \$2,000 will be discontinued in order to provide more available funds for the purchase of flowers. That \$2,000 in the past was used to help pay for the landscaping that was done around our grounds. Since we are likely to end they year with a surplus in our operating fund, it was determined that those funds would not be needed for 2022 and not proposed for the 2023 budget.

It is a busy time of the year at your home and at the church. We hope that you will allow yourselves sufficient time to reflect on this important time of preparation and anticipation and put everything into the proper perspective.

It is a pleasure to write a letter of gratitude to you, the ladies of Christ Lutheran, Wantagh, and those who make the desserts. Especially at this time of year we look to give thanks for our many blessings. Please accept our heartfelt gratitude for your faithful generosity. Your support reminds me of this saying by Sister Peggy Costa: "The way we take care of each other in life...in rain or sun...in hard times and easy times.... all the time!"

St John's monthly donations aren't just about good food. They "speak" to the guests of respect and dignity. They let people know how much someone cares. While our guests voice their appreciation with many thanks, our Grab and Go operation leaves no room for a personal reaction to the lunch itself. Before Covid, the guests would leave the dining area and tell the cooks and servers how delicious the food was that day. Now the guests don't know what's for lunch until they leave the soup kitchen.

St John's entrée lunches are like none other we serve. I don't know how many times our talented cook remarks about your turkey tetrazzini, saying, "It smells so good and is delicious!" From April to July, your wonderful ham tetrazzini (a break from beef and chicken) was the meal du jour. Your cold pasta salad didn't arrive until August. If it wasn't for St. John's, the third Monday of the month wouldn't have any dessert for the lunch bags.

Your food donations help us immensely. Our food donations as a whole, of all sorts, are changing. With things in constant flux, we have to be more flexible. Even as the number of guests per day averages 100, with an increasing number of children, the food we receive from LI Cares and Island Harvest has declined significantly, in spite of the strong demand at many pantries and soup kitchens.

St John's also gave us two surprising bonanza donations. In early April I came by to return your half size trays and lids used for the March meal. I left your parking lot with a windfall for the soup kitchen– a huge shopping bag loaded with all sorts of popular snack-sized candy and a tall stack of full-size, like-new aluminum pans. What a Godsend! Except for Valentine's Day we hadn't received any candy donations, and we were pricing out trays as we were down to a bare minimum. St John's enabled us to add two pieces of candy to the bagged lunch for weeks to come and saved a considerable expense.

Last, but not least, we want to give Bill Wilson and his back up, David Schmidt, special thanks for delivering, like clockwork, your food donations. Again and again, you have come to the assistance of the soup kitchen. Your kindness has literally followed our very change. We couldn't be more grateful.

May your hearts be filled with peace and happiness!

THE TWELVE PRAYERS OF CHRISTMAS

This season, you may find yourself humming along to a fanfavorite tune, "The Twelve Days of Christmas." But did you know that this Christmas Carol is actually a prayer?

Dating back hundreds of years, "Twelve Days" was originally a poem used by Christian clerics to celebrate Twelve-Tide, the dozen days of Christmas. Each day's "gift" was a symbol for different holy gifts. During the Middle Ages, when most people could not read, hearing the poem helped families to learn about the Christmas season. The poem is recorded as being printed for the first time in England in the year 1780. The poem was then set to music in 1909, and the rest... is history!

As you read on about the true meaning of this song, let us reflect on the true meaning of Christmas... and thank the Lord for our most special gift, His Son, Jesus Christ.

On the _____ Day of Christmas, My God gave to me...

<u>1. A Partridge in a Pear Tree</u>

The partridge symbolizes Jesus, whose birthday is the first day of Christmas. The partridge in the song is actually female, because mother partridges are the only species of bird that will sacrifice themselves to protect their children.

2. Two Turtledoves

The dove is a symbol for the Christian faith, because it's the bird of peace. The two turtledoves represent the Old and New Testaments, the story of our faith.

3. Three French Hens

Have you ever heard that French is the language of love? Well, here, that's not far off! This gift represents the Apostle Paul's First Letter to the Corinthians, where he writes about **faith**, **hope**, **and love**. As Paul reminds us, "the greatest of these is love."

4. Four Calling Birds

The four calling birds are Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John, the writers of the Gospels. The word "gospel" means **good news**, called out to all of God's people.

5. FIIIIVE GOOOOLLLDEN RIIIIINGSSSS!

The five gold rings symbolize the first five books of the Old Testament. In Hebrew, and in the Jewish religion, these books are called the Torah or the Pentateuch.

6. Six Geese a-Laying

The six eggs laid by the geese represent the six days of Creation. On the seventh day, God rested... and so did the geese.

7. Seven Swans a-Swimming

Swans are symbols of beauty. So, the seven swans are naturally the seven beautiful gifts of the Holy Spirit: Fear of the Lord, Wisdom, Knowledge, Counsel, Fortitude, Understanding, and Piety.

8. Eight Maids a-Milking

In feudal England, being a milkmaid was considered the lowest-level job. It was primarily very poor women who did this work... and back then, being those two things meant you were easily overlooked. So, this gift reminds us that Jesus dearly loves and blesses those who feel alone: the poor in spirit, the mourners, the meek, those who hunger and thirst for righteousness, the merciful, the pure in heart, the peacemakers, and the persecuted.

9. Nine Ladies Dancing

The nine ladies represent the nine fruits of the Holy Spirit: love, peace, joy, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control.

10. Ten Lords a-Leaping

In feudal England, being a lord meant you were in charge of upholding justice in the land. So, the ten lords are code for the Ten Commandments, the laws all Christians follow.

11. Eleven Pipers Piping

The eleven pipers represent Jesus' eleven Disciples. Remember, Judas is not included here because he betrayed Jesus.

<u>12. Twelve Drummers Drumming</u>

The twelve drummers represent the twelve points of the Apostles' Creed. Each beat *drums at* a different part of the Christian faith that we profess. While different denominations say different versions of the Creed, its core points are the same.

PROPERTY REPORT – DEC 2022

Our Volunteer Retiree Group continues to perform any maintenance and/or improvement items on the "Office" To-Do list, or that we uncover ourselves, and can accomplish ourselves without professional help.

Our recent activities have included:

- We continued a project to restore the Thrift Shop, Sanctuary, and 2000 stairway side cement "Washes" and cracks. Winter will curtail this effort.
- We responded to a "**No Pit Lights**", needed for that evening's NS parent meeting. We uncovered a bad photo sensor in the "Pit" door fixture and bypassed it so the bulb would stay on. We also uncovered a cracked and faulty Motion unit we managed to set "always on". We ordered a new motion unit and parts to repair both lights and installed them with a proper inside "switch" control and switch guard.
- We staged all the material for the "Tool Time" Fair area, to the Loggia and Room 10. The **Boy Scouts to moved it to the Gym and we thank them for this effort.**
- For the Fair... We re-arranged some tables, set-up the "Tool Time" area, activated the Gas stove, set out the "Fair" signs around the neighborhood and removed them after, and managed the "Tool Time" table with our limited force.
- We activated the Education Building heat, and set the "Roof Top" thermostats to "Heat" and to reflect Choir/Bell hours.
- We activated the Sanctuary side boilers and oiled the circulators,
- We replaced a slow running Gym clock. We **replaced the batteries** in a hands free faucet. We replaced the Thermostat batteries in the loggia and Room 2000.
- We shut down the Education Building De-humidifiers and Room 10 for the winter.
- We closed the Parsonage and Church lawn sprinkler systems, evacuating the water with the compressor and powering down the controllers.
- We shutdown the hose bibs and drained the hoses before removing them to storage.
- We turned back the time on 10 Telephones and numerous wall clocks with the time change and replaced the batteries in a few units. The Thermostats and Computers change automatically.
- We activated and deactivated the Advent wreath and Christmas flower stands.
- We moved the leftover Fair items from the main hallway to proper storage.
- We removed desks and cabinets from the office area for Special Pickup.
- We disassembled the lock on the rear yard door to access and tighten the loose outside cylinder.
- We installed the Christmas lights on the lawn tree while the weather was mild.
- We placed the Manger cutouts and Door Frame light bars in time for Christmas.
- We shut down the Parsonage Hot water heater and activated the Heat to minimum. We installed a new 7-day thermostat, to replace the non-working one.
- We activated the **Snow Blower** to be ready if needed.
