Finally, our tithes and offerings are needed for God's ministry at Christ Lutheran. We are facing a large deficit of over \$20,000 in our yearly budget. We also have over \$100,000 worth of repairs and updates needed for our parsonage and other church buildings. Your weekly and generous offering is essential for our financial health. During this difficult time, everything has to be done differently and much thought has to be put into planning out each project. We are grateful for the ladies from your church who faithfully come to help us with cooking for the soup kitchen, as some of our committee are not comfortable working inside the church with others at this time. We are careful to wear masks and gloves and social distance when cooking for the soup kitchen. We have had to change our entrees recipes that we prepare for the soup kitchen since they do not have sit down meals, nor do they use their ovens. #### **PROPERTY REPORT – MAR 2021**

Our **Small Aging Retiree Group** has resumed our pre-Pandemic activities. We have now caught up with most of the items on the To-Do list.

Our activities recently have included:

- We changed a "T8-U" florescent bulb in the 2000 bathroom and re-ordered.
- We replaced, and/or filed the hard rubber tips on a few doorstops.
- We ordered and installed a **locking mailbox** outside the Steinbicker entrance and located a key on the inside doorframe, and key box.
- We replaced a few <u>chirping smoke detector batteries</u> in the Education building and 10/20 area and re-ordered batteries. We remounted one smoke detector. We are researching the installation of extended life Detector/CO units with long life batteries.
- We tested and re-lamped, as required, the ELCA Christmas Lawn tree light strings and returned them to storage. We re-ordered more bulbs.
- We responded to some loose floor tiles in a NS classroom and the Loggia and re-secured them. We **thank Bob Rath** for re-tiling the 10/20 upper landing and threshold and middle landing of the thrift shop stairway.
- We **thank the Eagle Scout project of Hayden Naitra**, for the **new shed** to accept Thrift Shop incoming items. The overgrown corner shrub was removed and bagged by the scouts and the retirees moved the waste bags to the curb for TOH.
- We checked on a few of the **recent education building Inspection items** and found the Sanctuary Water Heater is working, but beyond its life cycle, The Sacristy sink **is not** leaking, a hands-free soap dispenser is **functioning properly**, and a long running main floor toilet Flushometer requires professional intervention when available.
- We purchased new easy to open **Plastic Towel Holders** for all the bathrooms to replace the old rusting ones (PIM\$108). They have all been installed with keys within reach.
- We thank Christian DeRuiter, our new Church Business Administrator for arranging for the long over due Fire Extinguisher Inspection and Tagging.
- We also thank Pastor Krahn for touching up the paint on his office door.
- We hung a couple of pictures in lower level Sunday school rooms.
- We responded to a **low heat** condition in 10/20 and found the #2 **Sanctuary boiler off** with no pilot. We were unsuccessful in lighting the pilot and called the plumber, (Bill Quinn 826-3253) who changed the thermocouple and master relay, restoring the boiler operation and full heat for the Friday Thrift Shop.
- The Steinbicker office thermostat was found in "SYSTEM OFF". We restored it to "Heat". We do not know who touched this thermostat, but the Nursery School Teachers and Children had to keep their coats on in the 62-degree classrooms. Please note: Thermostats anywhere should not be adjusted, except by those familiar with their operation. These are seven-day thermostats, programmed for all the activities scheduled in their areas.

#### THINGS TO DO

See Roger, Bob R, Bill, Craig, or Bob H. if you can help:

- \*Clean the ceiling light covers in room 10.
- \*Need inspection and tagging of all Fire Extinguishers. (CMPLT)
- \*Paint the Sliding Closet doors in the Gym South access area.
- \*Power Wash the front Steinbicker stairway, north 10-20 wall, etc "greens",
- \*Scrape and Paint the white trim above the Library and 2000 kitchenette.
- \*Arrange to grow grass on the East side of Steinbicker. Stones to pit?, Topsoil?, Sod?, Labor.
- \*Repair numerous **Cement issues** around the property. (Stairs, Pointing, washes, loose items, price professional intervention?).
- \*Prepare/Paint the outside **Room 20 North window** frame (Professional?).
- \*Clean and refurbish the vinyl replacement windows all around checking for smooth operation, weather stripping and locking capability. (Wkg)
- \*Research and arrange for a "Seal coating" and re-striping of the parking lot and the Parsonage driveway. (Spring)
- \* Touch up the Roof top Air duct "Rust spots" with Silver paint on hand.
- \* Refurbish Communion tables and replace the "red" felt shelf covers.
- \* Replace the broken NS window track hardware during February break.
- \* Install a mailbox outside the Steinbicker entrance. (CMPLT)
- \* Repair the thrift shop entrance door threshold. (CMPLT)
- \* Replace all the Smoke and CO detectors with new long life units.

#### **Research for Potential Projects**

- \* Research and report on the possibility of Siding on the 10/20 building.
- \* Research the installation of white vinyl ornate trim covering (Pilasters/Door Surrounds) in the front area outside the Sanctuary in lieu of continuously painting.
- \* Research the possibility of new lighting for the Sanctuary.
- \* Research the replacement of the wine stained Altar Carpeting.
- \* Research extending the lawn sprinkler to cover the East side of Steinbicker after grass restoration.
- \* Research installing Solar panels for electric on the Steinbicker building.
- \* Survey and Research all cement sidewalks, steps, ramps, and washes for professional intervention.
- \* Research having the lower two Steinbicker NS classroom Floor tiles removed, floor sealed and re-tiled. (NS issue)

The next step our congregation has to take in calling a permanent pastor is to form a subcommittee of the Transition Task Force to conduct a congregational Mission and Ministry Assessment. Once that is completed, we can proceed with the call process where we consider candidates for our permanent pastor.

The responsibilities of this subcommittee, to be known as the Assessment Team ("the Team"), are listed below. If you are interested in participating in this process, please let a member of the church council know or call the church office at 516 221-3286. We hope to get started as soon as possible. The events and meetings described below will be held in person or on Zoom, or a combination of both based on the decision of the team and as safety considerations allow.

#### CONGREGATION MISSION AND MINISTRY ASSESSMENT

Past - Present - Future Ministry

#### Conduct a History of our Church Sunday (recommended)

Invite the congregation to a **History Event following Sunday morning worship**. Plan for a two-hour event. Invite everyone; provide drinks, food, and a comfortable space to gather.

#### What you'll need:

- · Hospitality: food and drinks
- Cups, plates, napkins, utensils
- Tables, preferably circular, marked by decade, with three sheets of large poster paper at each table
- Large poster board (Post-its works really well), markers, dark bold colors

Appoint a recorder to write, and a reporter to share your findings as you begin.

# Discovering the Decades - Those attending will breakout into groups based on the decade they joined the congregation

- On the first sheet of paper, as a group, list: What, of significance, was happening in the WORLD?
- On the second sheet of paper, as a group, list: What was happening in RELIGION?
- On the third sheet of paper, as a group, list: What was happening with THIS CONGREGATION? For this particular
  question, consider building/construction dates, struggles, new leadership, neighborhood connections, etc.—all
  aspects of your story.

#### **Sharing the Story**

- Post each of the decades results around the room
- Share each of the decades with the whole group
- Ouestions to think about:
  - Are there any significant events missing?
  - What are common themes? What strikes you?
  - Do you see any particular impact of leadership?
  - What influence did personalities have on the community?
  - What impact did the community needs, or culture have on the congregation?
  - What impact did the congregation have on the community?
  - What role has the congregation taken on for the community and for individuals?

#### Introduce the CONGREGATION ASSESSMENT SURVEY (CAS)

The **Congregation Assessment Survey**, or CAS for short, is a congregation-wide survey that provides an in-depth look at the experiences, perceptions, and aspirations of a congregation. The CAS will provide a meaningful picture of your congregation and is an assessment instrument that can help your congregation:

- Measure the level of satisfaction and energy in the church.
- Identify the critical success factors for improving organizational climate.
- Discover what the congregation hopes to do and accomplish in the future.

- · Gauge readiness for change.
- Uncover potential resources you may be missing.
- Prepare for a search for your next pastor.

#### The Team will determine how best to distribute the survey to get maximum participation from the congregation

**Review** the results of the CAS during a gathering of the Council, the Transition Task Force, and the subcommittee. The CAS provides support for the team preparing the Ministry Site Profile, as well as providing invaluable perspective to the Call Committee as we seek our next pastor.

Give a summary report to the congregation on the results of the CAS.

### CONGREGATION ASSESSMENT SURVEY (CAS)

#### Define and Research the Demographics of the Community

There are numerous sources available to conduct this research. The ELCA provides the following resources, at no charge to you and included in your congregation's Mission Support. This tool is designed to help ELCA congregations gain a general understanding of their community and to plan their mission using that information.

The website link is: www.elca.org/research

There is a box "Demographic Reports" on the lower right-side margin. Click on "View Now."

You will need the synod code, which is 7C, and your congregational ID number. This number can be obtained by finding your congregation's parochial report (Form A) in your church files. If you still cannot find it, call the Metropolitan New York Synod Office, and ask for assistance.

#### Conduct a COMMUNITY ASSESSMENT PROBE (CAP)

Two members of the Team or the Council make two separate appointments with two local town officials. In our experience, two of the following persons are best: a local school principal, a local chief of police, a local town mayor or supervisor, a council member, or the leader of the local chamber of commerce.

Call to ask for an appointment, indicating you are from a local church and are in the process of searching for a new pastor, and seeking their input about the greatest needs in the community. You would like 15 minutes of the person's time.

Two of you go to the meeting, and at least one of you takes notes. During the conversation, you ask the following questions:

- In your experience, what do you see as the top two or three problems in our community?
- Whom do you see working on those issues?
- Do you have any concerns about our community as you look into the future, and if so, what are they?
- What could our church do to help improve the quality of life in our community?
- When we call a new pastor to our church, could we bring them in to meet you?

Immediately following the conversation, do the following:

- Write and mail a handwritten note thanking the official for their time and input.
- Write up your notes of the conversation and review them with your partner, in order to determine if you both heard the same information.
- After you have conducted both conversations, provide a verbal update to the congregation on the following Sunday, and make your written notes available to the congregation, especially the MSP team.

In our experience, every congregation that has engaged in this kind of Community Assessment Probe, reports that it is one of the most eye-opening experiences. The rewards of this exercise cannot be adequately expressed.

## COMMUNITY ASSESSMENT PROBE (CAP)

#### Conduct a "Play It Forward" Sunday (recommended)

Invite the congregation to a "**Play It Forward**" event following Sunday morning worship. Plan for a two-hour event. Invite everyone; provide drinks, food, and a comfortable space to gather.

#### What you'll need:

- Hospitality: food and drinks
- Large, open wall space
- Half-sheet pieces of paper
- Cups, plates, napkins, utensils
- Large pieces of paper
- Pens for everyone
- · Tables and chairs
- · Markers, dark/bold colors
- Post-it flags

#### With God, All Things Are Possible

- Give each individual a half sheet of paper, with the words: "If this congregation truly believes that with God, all things are possible, in the next three years I would see..."
- Have each person write an answer, post their answers on a wall, and then share their vision with everyone gathered
- Give everyone five "post-it flags," instructing them to choose their top five priorities or preferences
- Tally the responses and review the top five priorities that have emerged
- Reflect on these questions:
  - How do the priorities fit with critical success factors?
  - How do the priorities fit with the community needs assessment?
  - What kind of opportunities do these provide?
  - What threats are there to making these happen?

#### Wrap-Up/Draft of Mission Site Profile (MSP)

- Explain that the Team will create the profile, based on the information gathered
- Establish the date of MSP draft review with congregation
- Thank everyone for their time. Close with Prayer.

Release the draft version of the MSP on a Sunday and seek feedback from the congregation.

Also, begin to collect suggestions for questions that the Call Committee might ask a potential candidate, based on the MSP.

The Team will meet throughout the Transition process and will spend time filling out the MSP form. Following the "Play It Forward Event," the Team releases a first draft copy of the MSP to the entire congregation, requesting feedback. The congregation is given one week to respond with their suggestions, thoughts, or reflections.

After the week of input, the Team can revise the document. The final report should be submitted to the entire council for its review and possible revision, and also be made available to members of the Call Committee. After the MSP has been approved by the congregation council, a copy shall be sent to the Assistant to the Bishop and submitted to the ELCA database. The Assistant to the Bishop may consult with the Call Committee to review the completed MSP, discuss the hopes and vision of the congregation, and answer any remaining questions about the process.


