

#### Dear Friends,

The season of Lent has arrived. It is the third Lent that we will experience without a full-time pastor leading us. Throughout these last 28 months, we have continued to prepare for the day that we are able to welcome a new pastor. To continue our preparations, many people have been busy in a variety of ways.

A few weeks ago, a meeting was held with members of WELCA and the Thrift Shop. The goal was to discuss how to better utilize rooms 10 and 2000. The cleanup process has started with the help of volunteers from WELCA and the Thrift Shop. The re-organizing and removal of unneeded items in the large closets in the back of the room has given more space for storage. The Thrift Shop Boutique in room 10 now has an area for storage week to week. Every effort is being made so that each group using room 10 has productive, uncluttered storage. There are now no boxes lining the walls or under tables. Both outside groups using room 10 have assisted in the clean-up. TOPS is in the process of going through items they have in the closet and will be discarding what they no longer use. AA has helped to clean up their items left in the kitchen area. The kitchen has been cleared of items that no one has claimed ownership of. By the end of the month, we expect the kitchen to be clutter-free. As the clean-up in room 10 is completed, we will be looking at cleaning up some areas in room 2000.

Other areas of the church have been cleaned up as well. The pastor's office had five file cabinets relocated to other parts of the church. Book shelves were removed, and books were re-distributed and given away. The church office is also being looked at to see how it can be more functional. For those of you have been in the office, there are a lot of telephone wires and computer cables that need to be looked at to determine what is still active and necessary and what is outdated. That will be examined by professionals to assure us that we are doing the right thing.

But lots of areas still need attention. The Christian Education office at the south end of the second floor in Steinbicker Hall has file cabinets filled with mostly outdated material that needs to be reviewed before it can be thrown away. The Library needs to be organized into a more organized and functional space.

These are not the only areas around the church that need some attention. Can you help out? Let the church office know if you have some time to spare to offer. Do you have some new ideas of how to make better use of our space? We hope that you will share those with us.

#### THIS ASH WEDNESDAY, DISCOVER THAT LENT ISN'T WHAT YOU THINK IT IS

Wednesday marks the beginning of Lent, a season kept by millions and millions of Christians around the world. This season has a bad reputation. Too many people think of Lent merely as a time for intentional misery. People give up chocolate or stop watching a favorite TV show or some other form of self-inflicted hardship. But there's more to Lent than meets the eye.

The season of Lent began almost 2,000 years ago primarily as a time to prepare for Easter. Those who were to be baptized were prepared during this time. In the early centuries of the church, those who committed grievous sins were separated from the body of the faithful. During Lent, they could make amends and be restored to the church.

As we dig into Lent, we discover that the foundation of the season is built on deep joy. Making amends is hard work, but the resulting reconciliation is an occasion for true gladness.

The Bible teaches us again and again that there's always a second or third or hundredth chance to turn to God. And each time we turn to God, there is rejoicing in heaven. So if Lent helps us find our way to God again, there is gladness in our hearts and in heaven.

You may wonder how Lent got to be the way it is today. This season invites us to cast aside the things that keep us from following Jesus, and to embrace those things that help us along our journey.

So in Lent, I might give something up not to make myself miserable, but rather to take away a distraction from what is truly important. I might also give something up if this act helps me realize that I'm dependent on God alone and not on chocolate, or coffee, or TV. Misery for its own sake should not be the point.

Lent is also about taking things on. You might like to spend a little more time reading and studying the Bible. Maybe you'll read one of the Gospels or some other part of the Bible. Lent is also a great time to work on our habits of prayer. Scripture and prayer help us on our journey as followers of Jesus, so that's why we might take something on.

I wish we could rebrand Lent. Maybe someone will come up with an ad campaign to help us all see that Lent is, actually, the opposite of miserable. We can enjoy the gift of a whole season to focus on turning to Jesus, and nothing could be more joyful than that!

Part of Lent is taking an honest look at ourselves – what we have done wrong or ways we can use the gifts God has given us. A brutally honest self-examination is not very fun, but the Good News is that God loves us even when we make mistakes and offers us a path to start over. We begin by saying we're sorry, and then we make amends. It's not easy, but this grace-filled work can help us see that there's hope for us and for our world.

As always, the first day of Lent is Ash Wednesday. That's today.

Not surprisingly, the distinguishing feature of Ash Wednesday is the imposition of ashes. Small ashen crosses are drawn on the foreheads of worshipers as the priest says, "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return." It's a solemn moment.

This symbol of the cross on our foreheads reminds us Christians that we are marked as Christ's. The symbol of dusty ashes also reminds us that this earthly life is brief. All of humanity has one thing in common: one day we will all die. We will all turn to dust.

But this reminder isn't meant to terrorize us. Instead, it is an invitation to use the gift of this life well. God has given us so many blessings, including life itself. How shall we use these gifts?

Maybe you've never tried to observe Lent before. It's never too late! Find a church that observes Ash Wednesday today, if you can. Hear the call to change, to renew. Receive the reminder that earthly things do not save us.

Then throughout the season, I encourage you to read some Scripture. You could read any of the Gospels: Matthew, Mark, Luke or John. The psalms are also wonderful testimonies of God's grace and mercy, and you could read some or all of the psalms.

Try to pray at least once every day. If you're not sure what words to say, you can find prayers already written. Or you can just talk to God and say what's on your mind and in your heart.

May your Lenten journey be blessed with the deep joy of turning to God.



### **PROPERTY REPORT – MARCH 23**

Our Volunteer Retiree Group continues to perform any maintenance and/or improvement items on the "Office" To-Do list, or that we are notified about or uncover ourselves, and can accomplish without professional help.

Our recent activities have included:

- Winter has curtailed any further Cement patching and trim painting until spring.
- **Parking lot** intrusion is occurring due to the lack of proper lighting. We replaced a bad lamppost light bulb (PIM\$12) and we ordered and installed **a new motion/spot light arrangement** (PIM\$49) on the back corner pole, all controlled by the basement time clock.
- We lubricated the **Room 10 North** <u>Storeroom</u> door catch to operate properly. We tightened the hinges and installed a "stop" on the door to ease the closing and prevent the latch overstrike.
- We braced and riveted an aluminum ladder step found to be cracked.
- We removed the flag from the pole in preparation for a storm and replaced it after.
- We refurbished the lawn tree Christmas light strings, ready for next year.
- For preventive maintenance, we re-adjusted the **North Rooftop Fan** pulley and installed a new belt before adjusting the tension.
- We re-cemented a couple of loose floor tiles at the top of the north stairway.
- We refastened a loose threshold molding under the Upper Thrift Shop door.
- We responded to a **Saturday Thrift Shop**, "No Heat- Dead Thermostat" and replaced the batteries restoring both.
- In spite of having our "Heat lamps" in place, we uncovered **FROZEN Hot and Cold pipes in the upper Room 30 bathroom** in 10/20 during the very cold weather. We identified (and labeled) the valves feeding this area and closed them, anticipating a thaw and possible split pipes. When checked the next day, all was fine and we had avoided a split pipe situation.
- We initiated a search of the building plumbing plans to identify and label all the valves and their functions as time permits.
- We responded to a "can't lock" report on the back Room 10 door. We disassembled the latching mechanism and a simple cleaning and lube with WD40 fixed the problem.
- We continued our clean up of the lower shop area.
