SEIZE THE MORNING: NEW HABITS FOR THE NEW YEAR

Excerpts of article by David Mathis for Desiring God.

Is there any single habit more important than getting your soul regularly within earshot of God? Right there with the basic natural habits we cannot avoid — breathing, eating, sleeping — one supernatural habit stands at the fountainhead of all others for our spiritual life and health and growth in a new year: hearing God's voice in his word.

Vital as prayer and fellowship are, all spiritual life and health and growth begins, just as creation, with the word of God (Genesis 1:3). Is there anything more fitting, then, for starting every day in the new year than the word of God?

The Bible never commands the modern "quiet time." Nor does it specify that we must read our Bibles first thing in the morning. In fact, the concept of Christians having their own copy of the Scriptures for private reading is a fairly recent phenomenon in the history of the church. So, here at the outset of the year, we're not talking mainly about an obligation but an opportunity. For Christians, getting our souls within consistent earshot of God's voice in his word is as basic as sleeping and eating and even breathing. Our fully human Savior himself said, quoting Deuteronomy 8:3, "Man shall not live by bread alone, but by every word that comes from the mouth of God" (Matthew 4:4). If Jesus needed his Father's revealed words for daily human living, how much more his fallen brothers?

What we do each morning in the first fifteen to thirty minutes of our day is doubly revealing: it reveals both where our treasures really lie, as well as the trajectory of desires and decisions that will direct the day and, over time, our life. Therefore, while the Bible does not command morning devotions, all Christians would do well to consider starting each day in the Book. What baby steps might you take, along with these suggestions below, toward a new-year's resolve to be in the Bible more next year?

AUDIT YOUR MORNING HABITS

Alexander Hamilton famously wrote, "Man is very much a creature of habit." And perhaps especially so first thing in the morning. The relatively new "science of habit" can help us with this. As Jerome Groopman explains, writing on habits in The New Yorker, and quoting author Wendy Wood, Our minds have "multiple separate but interconnected mechanisms that guide behavior." But we are aware only of our decision-making ability — a phenomenon known as the "introspective illusion" — and that may be why we overestimate its power. In other words, because our conscious thoughts direct only a limited

amount of our behaviors — and we are, unsurprisingly, very conscious of our consciousness! — we tend to overestimate our willpower. New-year's resolves, apart from the formation of new habits, likely will not become new-year realities. A great place to start is with being honest about what your current habits are. Ask yourself, What are my morning habits? What do I typically do in those first fifteen minutes to half hour each day? What is my morning routine, not ideally but practically? What's the sequence of what I actually do first thing in the morning?

IDENTIFY THE COST

New habits typically don't come easily. They aren't "free." There is some attendant cost. New habits that really matter don't just typically thread into your current ones. They must displace the old. According to Groopman, "the key lies not in breaking a habit through willpower but in replacing one habit with another." With regard to your mornings, make conscious decisions to change tangibles in your world that will guide your subconscious. So ask, How can I get into the word of God in those first moments of each day? What needs to wait until later in the day, or go away altogether, to make space for what's more important?

CREATE BARRIERS TO THE BAD

After identifying the bad habits keeping you from what's more important, make concrete plans against them. Create "friction" between the bad habits of checking email or getting sidetracked in texts or notifications. Or turning on the TV. Or reading something else less important. Make them inconvenient. Take steps to remove or keep yourself from whatever is keeping you from the Bible.

INCENTIVIZE THE GOOD

Reading the Bible is not a chore, and there's no virtue in making those moments as unpleasant as possible. Identify an inviting space, consider conducive sounds (whether silence or beloved soundtracks), and "treat yourself," within reason, to solidify the habit of coming first to God's word in the morning. In doing so, of course, we want to develop a palate that increasingly tastes and enjoys God's goodness in his word so that the real incentive and greatest reward is knowing and enjoying him.

For those of us who are serious, especially here at the outset of a new year, about making daily and consistent access to God's word vital in the new year, and the rest of our lives, we look, in and through our efforts and strategies, to God himself as the one who gives the growth (1 Corinthians 3:6–7), if it is real growth. He is the one who grows our faith (2 Corinthians 10:15) and his church (Acts 6:7; 12:24; 19:20) through his word, and the one who stands ready to have his gospel word bear fruit and grow in our lives (Colossians 1:6, 10).



PROPERTY REPORT – JAN 2023

Our **Volunteer Retiree Group** continues to perform any maintenance and/or improvement items on the "Office" To-Do list, or that we are notified about or uncover ourselves, and can accomplish without professional help.

Our recent activities have included:

- Winter has curtailed any further Cement patching and Trim painting until spring.
- We placed the Manger cutouts and spots on the lawn in time for Christmas.
- We installed and tested the Sanctuary door Christmas light bars, and set the timer.
- We placed the Sanctuary "Window Spotlights" after the final lawn cleanup.
- We activated the "Freeze" lamp fixtures in the 10/20 area to prevent frozen pipes and activated the 300-bathroom wall heater on low.
- We removed the "lamb" banner to storage and activated the Christmas card banner.
- We staged all the Snowmelt material and shovels at the entrance doors.
- We thank the Scouts for their thorough fall cleanup and bagging of the leaves. We moved many bags (25-30) to the curb for TOH pick-up on Wednesday, BUT the bags were gone Tuesday with the regular Garbage, INCLUDING the many remaining bags (20-40) left along the fence for the following week??? We thank the TOH for this effort above and beyond.
- We investigated the "Pulpit Microphone" thumping and crackling issue. We adjusted the microphone end cap but suspect the Pulpit connector to be the culprit. It is fastened directly to the pulpit and all vibrations are amplified, and movements cause the base connector to crackle. We sprayed the connector contacts to reduce the Crackle and cushioned the base, which we hope will reduce the Thump.
- We investigated a Sunday "no-heat" issue from the **North Roof Top unit**. We found the fan belt dislodged, stretched, and frayed causing the unit to shut down via the heat limit sensor. We replaced the belt and adjusted the tension, restoring the heat. We feel this belt failed because we did not "readjust" (after a month) the new belt we installed in our last pulley replacement maintenance back in April 2022.
- We installed the eight (8) Boy Scout Christmas wreaths at all the entrance doors.
- We determined that the corroded and **leaking faucet in the Library** required a new unit, which we ordered and installed. The 2" Trap wall-pipe was also rusted through and leaking and had to be replaced.
- We closed the Thrift Shop A/C unit for the winter.
- We moved Decorations and ladders in preparation for decorating the church, and assisted with the hangings and Tree. We installed a new Power Switch on the Christmas tree.
- At NS request, we reprogrammed the lower level thermostat for new school hours.
- We replaced a broken spotlight socket in front of the Steinbicker stairs.

RESEARCH FOR POTENTAL LONG RANGE PROJECTS

- * Research the possibility of **new lighting for the Sanctuary**.
- * Research the replacement of the wine stained Altar Carpeting.
- * Research extending the **lawn sprinklers** to cover the East side of Steinbicker **after grass restoration**.
- * Research the possibility and costs to remove and refurbish the Original Steeple Bell and Cradle.

MISCELLANEOUS THINGS TO DO

See Roger, Bob R, Bill, Craig, Gene, Bob H, or Vinny if you can help:

- *Paint the Sliding Closet doors in the Gym South access area.
